This course will guide you through the process of planning and executing a literature search using specialist search tools such as Ovid and EBSCO. At the end of the session you'll be able to:

- Create and plan a search strategy using keywords and Subject Headings
- Use your strategy in databases such as Medline, Embase, or CINAHL
- Know how to refine your results to make them more relevant
- Save your search and set up alerts to help keep you up-to-date with your topic
